## Future City Competition

On January 24th, a group of twelve volunteers from Drexel SWE attended the 14th Annual Philadelphia Regional Future City Competition.

In the Future City Competition, groups of middle school students are asked to design a futuristic city that solves a specific engineering problem using SimCity software, and then build a scale model of a section of their city with a budget of only \$100. The cities are judged by a panel of professional engineers, and the students also have a chance to compete for a large number of Special Awards which address specific areas of city planning.

Many of our Drexel SWE volunteers pitched in as runners who helped get the teams and their models to and from the judging rooms. One of our members was an event photographer, and the remaining volunteers helped with the judging process.

SWE judged a Special Award for Family Friendly Neighborhoods on behalf of the National Association for Women in Construction. The honor was given to Wissahickon Charter School for "Greenville City," which included bike and car share programs, safe biking and walking pathways, and community vegetable gardens.

The overall winner of the 2009 Future City Competition was Kutztown Middle School for their city "Vetniborg," which is pictured below.
